Opioid Use & Disability

Physical and mental disabilities correlate with increased odds of opioid abuse.

Risk factors:

- High rate of medication prescribed for health problems
- Societal enabling
- Lack of understanding of the unique circumstances of people with disabilities and opioid use
- Lack of identification of prevention and treatment

Unintentional death through opioid overdose is more likely for people with a spinal cord injury or TBI.



Opioid Deaths in Kentucky



In 2017, Kentucky's opioid death rate was the fourth highest in the country.

Misuse of prescriptions for pain relief (non-synthetic and synthetic) and heroin use can lead to opioid addiction.
